Pine Valley Run on Labor Day-Do you want easy or hard?

The Lost Forester Run is a new challenge for this year's 5th annual fundraiser. This Adventure Run is designed to be hard. It is a 20K--more or less--up and down the steepest hills, through swamps, creeks,



and dense woods. The route is 11K of trails followed by 9k of off-trail path marked with ribbon. Runners will be self-supporting the whole distance. Bring your own water, gels, and compass (required for all participants for safety). Long sleeve shirts, pants, and sturdy shoes are highly recommended.

The Pine Valley 5.5k and 11k Trail Runs, on the other hand, are similar to previous years, winding through scenic pines and hardwoods, suitable for runners of all levels. Come join us for a pleasant run through the woods on wide, mowed trails at the Pine Valley Recreational Area.

Growing their own food

The 9 acres at the Blue House become more productive every year. Housemother Ziporah oversees the gardens, sharing her agriculture education and experience with the girls and other staff.

In March the Peace Corps visitors taught everyone how to plant a permagarden, which allows more vegetables to grow more efficiently in a smaller area. The director reported, "Unlike the beans we planted in our larger garden which usually grow in three to four months before harvest, the beans in the permagarden were ready for harvest in two and a half months." Some collard greens were transplanted to their traditional garden along with those that remained in the permagarden, and the girls have enjoyed them with their meals. We are so thankful for this knowledge that is now improving nutrition.

Dig deep to store water, pile soil in mounds for the seeds. Add ash for minerals, manure for nitrogen, charcoal for water retention, and egg shells for calcium.
