Agnes and Grace remember

Beatrice Garubanda saw how AIDS and other diseases had devastated her home village in Uganda, and how the remaining adults were overwhelmed with orphans. She started the Blue House in 2004. Grace and Agnes were among the first girls whose lives she transformed. When they were asked to think back to those days, and subsequent opportunities, they shared their memories.

Agnes: Auntie Beatrice saw orphans in desperate need and felt touched because we were homeless and had no close relatives able to take care of us. Worst of all, most children in the community were not in school since they had no one to provide school fees and other basic necessities.

Grace: Beatrice has inspired me because... she would find us in the village and she would call us to come... We had mud on our faces... She was a social person, social to everyone, to kids mostly and the elders... she really had a good heart.

The Blue House girls now

We are currently supporting 35 girls: 16 in primary grades (plus 4 receiving Home Based Support for schooling while living with relatives), 9 in Ordinary Level high school, and 2 at Advanced Level. And 4 young women are funded for post-secondary education: two in Vo Ed: Jenipher in Hair Dressing, and Flavia in Catering, Tourism, and Hotel Management; and Peace and Ovious are in their final year at Makerere University.

- A: She bought some old semipermanent houses where we started a new life, the Blue House. She hired sister Medius to care for us twelve girls: Evas, Peace, Ovius, Allen, Sarah, Dorcus, Jackline, Ovia, Flavia, Rosemary, Agnes and Grace. Operations were under the care of Uncle Sere Tuhairwe and his wife Natunda Provia, sister to Beatrice.
- *G:* She inspires me to work with people of different backgrounds. Because for us we were from humble backgrounds but she still loved us.
- A: What a joy it was to see ourselves going back to school again, eating good food. Like other villagers, we used kerosene lamps, and walked 2 kms to fetch water. We helped our young sisters in washing clothes, utensils, cooking and digging.

I will never forget the tragedy that befell the Blue House family in 2005 when our dearest Aunt Beatrice died. We spent days and nights crying, mourning for her. We could not eat anything because we thought that was the end of our future. I am thankful to the friends and family of the late Beatrice, both boards in America and Uganda, for ensuring that Beatrice's hope continues.

Time came after my senior four, I moved out of Blue House and went to YMCA Comprehensive Institute, Kampala branch, to do a two year certificate in Hotel and Institutional Catering and Management. After my graduation I got a job in Kampala working in a bookstore.

G: I was the first one to go to university. It was a God-given chance. I felt happy and proud of the Blue House, the board and all of them. I was excited. And I really appreciate them... because they made me what I am and what I will be in the future.

The Director was counseling me with the matrons, and I thank them for their support because they would bring me hope, because campus wasn't easy. And the tuition fees, they're high; I thought I couldn't make it. But the Blue House (donors) helped me. I thank them.
