Pandemic Year Two Covid-19 in Uganda

The coronavirus continues unabated in Uganda. *The number of reported cases increased from 200 per day in April to more than 1,500 per day in mid-June. At that time, more than a thousand people had been admitted to health facilities and there has been a serious shortage of oxygen. The number of deaths from the pandemic in Uganda was more than 2,500 in late July.

In an effort to control this latest surge, the Ugandan government has again imposed a very strict lockdown. People must shelter at home. No travel is allowed except for essential reasons, such as transporting someone who is ill to a health facility, and no travel is allowed outside of each district. No visitation is allowed, even with neighbors.

Schools, including higher education institutions, are again closed. The lockdown continues until July 30 and perhaps longer if cases and deaths don't decline. If the Delta variant becomes dominant, the surge will likely worsen.

Very little Covid vaccine has reached Uganda. Out of a population of 45 million people, only about 1.1 million (.024%) have received at least one dose, and 0.01% have been fully vaccinated. No one at the Blue House has been vaccinated.

Blue House During Coronavirus

This time around the girls residing at the Blue House have been allowed to shelter there, rather than being sent to live with relatives, as was the case last year. The drought remains and food continues to be scarce.

Currently, 28 girls live in the Blue House: 16 primary students, 11 secondary students, and one studying tailoring at the Margaret Krohn Institute. In addition, 8 girls and boys are being supported at home, and 5 former residents are funded in postsecondary education away from the Blue House.

While schools are closed and the lockdown is in effect, the postsecondary students are staying with their guardians. Online classes are available and they have laptops and phones, but lack access to electricity.

Postsecondary students currently include Catherine (Kampala School of Health Sciences, in nursing), Christine

(Bukalasa Agricultural Institute), Lillian (Busitema University, in medical school), Monica (Mbarara Institute for Social Development) and Olivious (Bishop Stuart University).

The girls at the Blue House are healthy and keeping busy with learning activities, including computer skills, tailoring and weaving, and helping with the care of crops and livestock. During this lockdown no school tutorial classes are being offered via radio and TV. The staff are required to remain in residence during the lockdown, too. No visitors are allowed.

The staff is counseling the girls on strictly observing how to avoid getting and spreading the virus ... wearing masks, hand sanitation, etc. They are emphasizing becoming responsible adults and community leaders.

The Farm

Crop yields are reduced due to the continuing drought. Groundnut harvest yielded only one sack—enough for one month. The harvest of matooke from the banana plantation was only 14 bunches, enough for only three meals.

The animals are also affected by the drought. There isn't enough pasture for the three cows and two calves, but surplus livestock cannot be sold at present because of restrictions in the district. Likewise the pigs—the sows produced a total of 22 piglets but they can't be sold yet. The sty is being enlarged to accommodate all the pigs until more of them can be sold.

New Clothing arrives from the University of Minnesota



The girls are stepping out, and joyfully modeling their new outfits, designed and made especially for them by University of Minnesota clothing design students.

Since 2012, Prof. Lucy Dunne's Clothing Design class at the University of Minnesota has been designing and sewing new clothing for the Blue House. Ishaka Mawanda, US Board President, visited the Blue House in April and brought a large and generous supply of new clothing from the U students. These outfits had been made in late 2019 but had not been delivered before travel ended in 2020, and university classes went virtual that year. So after 2 years, the delivery of new clothes was a joyous event for the girls.

Request for prayers and support

The director in Uganda, Merab Gloria, the staff, and the girls ask that we pray for them during this new surge in the pandemic. Fortunately, thus far everyone at the Blue House has remained healthy, but without vaccines, the risk of contracting the virus continues. And the on-going drought is also making it very hard for many Ugandans to survive during the lockdowns.
